

## Minors' Access to Confidential Health Services

The Coalition for Responsible Sex Ed advocates for the preservation of the Minors' Consent statute (**Minnesota Statute 144.341-347**) in Minnesota. Access to confidential services helps young people be safe and healthy.

### Health care professionals support minor consent.

- The American Medical Association (AMA), the American Academy of Pediatrics, American Public Health Association and the Minnesota Public Health Association publicly support a minor's right to consent to their own health care.<sup>1</sup>
- Pediatricians described confidentiality as essential to obtaining necessary and factual information from adolescent patients.<sup>1</sup>

### The role of parental involvement

- The minors' consent law does not ignore the value of parent-child communication. In fact, health care professionals help adolescents reconnect and communicate better with parents and adults.<sup>2</sup>
- Current law respects the role of the health care provider as the expert and does not restrict their ability to inform parents or guardians about a minor's health status, especially in situations in which failure to inform them would jeopardize the health of the minor.
- Research shows that mandatory parental consent laws do not convince adolescents to share their health concerns with their parents, but rather increase health risks to adolescents.<sup>3,4</sup>
